

of and Dark

An Exploration of Colors in Church Life

It is summertime, and a church mouse's thoughts turn towards paraments. Blue, burgundy, gold, purple, white, and green — a whole rainbow of colors used to decorate our church through the seasons. I had intended to start a series of articles on the different colors but then realized that first, I need to tell you about dark versus bright.

Before Sir Isaac Newton published his treatise, "New Theory of Light and Colors" in 1672, color was organized from light to dark. White was on one end of the spectrum, black on the other and all the colors lined up in between. A color like blue would actually be in various places across the spectrum. A sky blue would be on the light side of the spec-

trum and dark blue would be next to black. Our rubrics reflect this understanding of color. A season or feast is assigned either "bright" or "dark". How this worked out in church is that a bright feast like Pentecost could correctly be decorated in white, gold, and bright red whereas a dark feast like Dormition could be decorated in burgundy, black, and gold.

Another aspect of bright and dark is matte versus brilliant. The light colors must also be brilliant and the dark colors matte. While light pink is on the light side of the spectrum, salmon pink is both

bright and brilliant and could and has been used in liturgical items.

The third aspect of all this is quality. The material used is the best that can be afforded, clean, and not worn out. Did you notice during the Pentecostal season, we use our white, red, blue, green, gold paraments? The green paraments we have were showing their long-lived life. It was correct for us according to the rubrics to use the bright colored patterned paraments during the bright Pentecostal season.

There is one place at St. Mary where you can see this reference to bright versus dark. It's the lampada that hangs from the ceiling in front of the iconostasis. The glass votive holder will

> be either clear or burgundy. No other color is used up there. Honestly, it because haven't been able to find something that would work up there, but now - I rather like the used of just bright and dark.

The Dormition Fast: The Perfect Fast for Taking Your Fasting Skills to a New Level

The Dormition Fast takes place each year from August 1 through August 14. It accordingly takes place every year right in the middle of summer. While those trying to comply with the Orthodox fasting rules can easily find that challenging during the summertime, when neighbors are in the middle of barbequing hamburgers and hot dogs, and the rising hot temperatures bring on an increased appetite for ice cream, I am going to posit that you can take your fasting skills to a whole new level during the Dormition Fast this year. Unlike the Nativity Fast and Great Lent, which are each much longer than a month, The Dormition Fast is only two weeks long. It is a lot easier, whether you are new to fasting or just trying to take your fasting to a new level, to fast for just two weeks than it is to fast for well more than a month. Indeed, last year, due to my work commitments, I had to schedule a summer vacation during the Dormition Fast, and I found that even away from home, I was able to carefully watch what I ate. The fact that my hotel was less than one walking mile away from a grocery store was a sign to me that God and His Mother were trying to help me follow the fast even when I was on vacation.

So, this year, when you see your neighbors chomping down on hamburgers, hot dogs, and ice cream,

thank God that modern science has given humanity vegan equivalents for each of these items. We can still enjoy each of these items with our neighbors the first weeks of Augustjust vegan style! \(\Psi\)
